Welcome from the Artistic Director

Hard Rain SoloistEnsemble's 24/25 season retains a focus on local composers while also moving beyond our Belfast base with a growing number of international endeavours. This action-packed 12th year of concerts brings the global contemporary music scene ever-closer.

Building on our connections in Ireland and internationally, this season offers an extensive range of collaborative activities and imaginative programmes. Listeners across NI are inherently curious, adventurous and excited by innovation, and so we are thrilled to share a wealth of new music with our growing local audiences as well as bringing the richness of current Irish composition further afield.

We celebrate collaborations with illustrious artists (composers, sound-artists, instrumentalists, singers, song-writers, conductors, dancers, choreographers, film-makers, writers and poets) which enhance our connections across the arts and open doors to new locations and concert formats.

Whilst we begin our Concert Season as always in Autumn, the summer months of 2024 remained busy with workshops this year. Starting several new partnerships, we enjoyed working with Ulster Touring Opera, at the first NI Film-Scoring Summer School with Dumbworld in Derry, and the first Belfast Conducting Workshop. With some sessions in August unfortunately impacted by the shameful xenophobic riots across our city, we also highlight and celebrate the cultural diversity and positivity that reflects Northern Ireland's changing demographics. We take some inspiration from this vear's Venice Biennale entitled Stranieri Ovunaue - Foreigners Everywhere. From a series of works by the Paris-born and Palermo-based Claire Fontaine collective, consisting of neon sculptures in different colours that render in a growing number of languages the words "Foreigners Everywhere". The phrase comes, in turn, from the name of a Turin collective who fought racism and xenophobia in Italy in the early 2000s.

"The expression Stranieri Ovunque has several meanings. First of all, that wherever you go and wherever you are you will always encounter foreigners—they/we are everywhere. Secondly, that no matter where you find yourself, you are always truly, and deep down inside, a foreigner."

With this in mind, we are delighted to present *Songs* of *Travel*, a new work by Elaine Agnew. This *Creative Europe Cooperation Project* aims to raise awareness and foster empathy for climate change and migration through music and explores the personal stories of five individuals as they fled their troubled homelands of Syria, Vietnam, Italy, Turkey and Ukraine in search of new beginnings in Europe.

Environmentalism is perhaps most pronounced in our *Irish Forests*, *Rivers*, *Peatlands* programme. In using specialist field recordings from specific locations in Antrim, Donegal and Wicklow, we highlight the need for protective measures to be taken in maintaining unique and beautiful landscapes. We're proud to bring this programme, conceived at SARC, to *Huddersfield Contemporary Music Festival* and also introduce it to local audiences at *Sound of Belfast festival*.

Our Elemental programme for the launch concert in Belfast and Castleconnell Autumn Concert Series with RTE Lyric FM in Limerick also takes inspiration from the great outdoors. Each highly-atmospheric piece shines a spotlight on our environment, history, mythology, language, and creative processes.

Conflict is the inspiration behind our Peaceline Perspectives programme which we bring further afield again this year to University of Sheffield. Having recently performed a version of this in Berlin at Classical:NEXT, this programme includes voices from across the city and resonates particularly strongly with audiences by setting a unique context for the music, especially when reflecting on Belfast's recent UNESCO City of Music status.

Portraits of significant composers allow us to focus on the output of leading figures of contemporary music such as Piers Hellawell, with whom we enjoy continued close collaboration. In bringing this programme to St Andrews University New Music Week, we celebrate Piers' honorary professor role there and mark his enormous contribution to new music in Ireland also. We also celebrate the anniversary year of two giants of Italian Virtuosity: Luciano Berio and Domenico Scarlatti by making musical connections across the centuries. Collaborating with us on this concert at Ulster Museum and also for Distant Plains in December we are delighted to join forces once more with the incredible Maiden Voyage Dance.

Collaborations with Hashtag Ensemble from Warsaw throughout 2025 will see their musicians join our ensemble for our International Women's Day concert featuring new Northern Irish and Polish music. We return the favour in July when Hard Rain musicians travel to Warsaw to perform at AżTak festival.

Ink Still Wet continues to present the newest of new music with an exclusive programme of world premieres, recent revisions and featuring some of the most established and exciting emerging composers in Northern Ireland. This year we bring the concert to both Belfast and Derry in a new partnership with Northern Lights Project and supported by Ulster University.

Local history brings us to the *Titanic Museum* for a one-day residency with *Ulster Youth Orchestra*, while music which takes inspiration from poetry and prose fills our *Folds of Time* concert, a very special Irish/French programme imbued with depth and poignancy and featuring a host of wonderful guest artists.

As always, the thank yous are so important, the most important of which goes to our principal funder the Arts Council of Northern Ireland for supporting the many strands of our work. We are honoured to be Ensemble-in-Residence at Queen's University, to have the opportunity to work with the wonderful staff and students all year round and be housed in their fantastic facilities. Thanks once more to PRS Foundation, whose funding through the Talent Development Network supports our Ink Still Wet scheme for which we have 17 composers involved and 5 awarded commissions. Thanks to British Council for supporting our 2025 UK/Poland initiative and to **Creative Ireland** for supporting our Contemporary Cities project with Limerick City Council. Most of all we thank our supportive friends of the ensemble and our amazing audiences who take this journey with us.

Hard Rain continue to push the boundaries, and your enthusiasm, excitement and support for what we do is what makes it all worthwhile.

This programme takes a unified approach to the intertwining of instrumental and environmental sounds. The three composers are field-recording practitioners focusing on sites which are sensitive to environmental change. These sites are the focus of continuous listening and recording practices over several years. Each piece deals with a particular ecosystem: forests, rivers and peatland - unique habitats which share sonic qualities as well as presenting distinct features. The sites are across counties Antrim, Donegal and Wicklow, a mix of public and private spaces with a range of human engagement and intervention.

These works cultivate active listening for both performers and audiences, a kind of 'listening in the field'. This is explored through open compositional approaches, including graphic and audio scores as well as the use of field recordings from each of the sites, as well as live electronic elements. The programme is presented in an immersive spatial audio format (ambisonics), inviting the audience to a shared listening experience.

Peaceline Perspectives

Wednesday 20th November 2024 Firth Hall, University of Sheffield, Sheffield 7.30pm

Peaceline Perspectives: Voices from a Divided City features highly evocative pieces by Northern Irish composers from the last decade. The music is interwoven with voices and soundscapes inspired by Belfast's Peaceline which separates the nationalist and loyalist communities. This performance showcases the work of multiple composers whose musical voices are shaped by their shared heritage. Greg Caffrey's Tout (a slang term meaning informer) reflects on the horror, danger and mistrust prevalent during Northern Ireland's Troubles. Elaine Agnew's I want to tell you consists of instrumental duos accompanying a pre-recorded voice track of victims, survivors and displaced families affected by conflict, while Eduard Zatrigi's War Games brings the programme to an impassioned and dramatic conclusion.

Connecting Celtic nations to Asia Pacific, this programme brings together some of the most exciting voices in contemporary music. Virtuosity bounds forward in Sam Chambers award-winning piece and we showcase solo works by Sean Doherty and Liza Lim which requires wielding not one, but two bows. Celebrating new connections with Wang Lu (China/USA), Luka Ventner (Aotearoa/NZ), Lisa Robertson (Scotland) and Geoff Hannan (England/Ireland) and with inspiration drawn as widely as possible from sources such as Greek mythology, Mongolian Folk Music, Orkney and St Magnus, modern satirical TV and Italian Baroque music, this is a unique exploration of local and international composition.

Sólás Charity Concert

Hard Rain are delighted to perform alongside Northern Ireland Opera, M'ANAM, The Ulster Consort and The Cross Border Youth Orchestra in this fundraising event for Sólás Special Needs Charity. Based on Belfast's Ormeau Road, Sólás was established 15 years ago to provide practical supports to children and young people, (2–18yrs) with moderate to severe disabilities and their families. They are raising funds for a new purpose-built community facility.

Hard Rain will perform two beautifully atmospheric pieces both inspired by poetry. Greg Caffrey's These are the Clouds About the Fallen Sun was written "as an elegy, and reflects a very personal interpretation of the Yeats poem. So, rather than the accepted reading of the poem as a requiem for the demise of traditional values in the face of modernity, I have expressed here a more orthodox sense of loss. Technically the piece reflects my preoccupation. at the time of writing, with the creation of more spacious and 'beautiful' sound-worlds... The piece was written in memory of my late brother Marc Caffrey". Claude Debussy's impressionist masterpiece Prélude à l'après-midi d'un faune was inspired by Mallarmé's poem and is presented here in a new arrangement for Pierrot Quintet.

Hard Rain are proud to present this recital in partnership with the Ulster Youth Orchestra. Here our two Featured Young Artists perform as soloists and with the ensemble. This year we have chosen Violinist Orla McGarrity, who is currently pursuing a Masters at RNCM in Manchester, and Flautist Laoise Corrigan, who is currently studying at Guildhall School of Music & Drama.

The programme is bookended by two recent works: Raymond Deane's 2023 commission for Hard Rain Skew Weft and Kevin Free's Kittens in the Kitchen, a finalist in the Peter Rosser Award 2024. Our Young Artists include a range of virtuosic and atmospheric solos from local composers Deirdre McKay and Daniel Quigley, alongside international counterparts: a Japanese-inspired work from Dutch composer Wil Offerman, a Dance from leading American flautist-composer Valerie Coleman, and Preludes by the Soviet-born Austrian-American Lera Auerbach.

In a long and distinguished career, Piers Hellawell has produced a body of work characterised by boundless invention, genuine discovery and deep integrity. His enduring creative partnerships are reflected in this programme presented by Hard Rain, with whom he has enjoyed a long-standing collaboration. As one of the UK's most distinguished Educators (Professor of Composition at Queen's University of Belfast 1981-2024, and now Honorary Professor of Composition at the University of St Andrews), this concert also showcases two highly talented students of Piers from the past and present. Their works will be performed alongside some of Hellawell's most celebrated chamber pieces from across the span of his composing career. His music is published by Edition Peters (London) Ltd.

St Andrews New Music Week was established in 2015 with the aim of creating a festival that draws together specialist performers to work with students on the music of emerging and establishing composers from around the world. The festival has given many notable world and territorial premieres and also forged many interdisciplinary connections. Hard Rain are delighted to be featured this year, giving workshops and performances alongside St Andrews' students and collaborating with Grammy Award-winning Lucy Schaufer for this special portrait concert.

Songs of Travel is a Creative Europe Cooperation Project that aims to raise awareness and foster empathy for climate change and migration through music. In collaboration with the Austrian game developers Causa Creations, Elaine composed the specifically curated soundtrack for Songs of Travel, an interactive graphic novel that explores various aspects of and collectively paints a vivid picture of the topic of migration through the personal stories of five individuals as they fled their troubled homelands of Syria, Vietnam, Italy, Turkey and Ukraine in search of new beginnings in Europe.

Premiered at Music for Galway's 2024 Cellissimo Festival with the original soundtrack performed live against a large-scale projection of the visual novel, Songs of Travel was then performed in Sweden (Fairplay Chamber Music), Norway (Valdres Sommersymfoni), the Netherlands (Piano Biënnale) and most recently featured as part of an exhibition Substanz at the Künstlerhaus Gallery in Vienna.

New Music Dublin

Surround Sounds: Irish ForeSts, Rivers and Peatlands

Thursday 3rd April 2025 Kevin Barry Room, National Concert Hall Dublin 3.30pm €17.50

This programme takes a unified approach to the intertwining of instrumental and environmental sounds. The three composers are field-recording practitioners focusing on sites which are sensitive to environmental change. These sites are the focus of continuous listening and recording practices over several years. Each piece deals with a particular ecosystem: forests, rivers and peatland – unique habitats which share sonic qualities as well as presenting distinct features. The sites are across counties Antrim, Donegal and Wicklow, a mix of public and private spaces with a range of human engagement and intervention.

These works cultivate active listening for both performers and audiences, a kind of 'listening in the field'. This is explored through open compositional approaches, including graphic and audio scores as well as the use of field recordings from each of the sites, as well as live electronic elements. The programme is presented in an immersive spatial audio format (ambisonics), inviting the audience to a shared listening experience.

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The Sinking of the Titanic

with Ulster Youth Orchestra & Limerick School of Music

Sunday 27th April 2025 Titanic Belfast All-day Pop-up Performances & 5pm Ensemble Performance Free

Hard Rain, Ulster Youth Orchestra and Limerick School of Music count down the hours to their joint ensemble performance at 5pm, appearing around the atrium of Titanic Belfast at every hour with short chamber ensemble performances. Visitors can wander between different spaces during the performances, hearing the music from many different angles.

The Sinking of the Titanic is inspired by the story that the band on the RMS Titanic continued to perform as the ship sank in 1912. It imagines how the music performed by the band would reverberate through the water for some time after they ceased performing. Composed between 1969 and 1972, the work is now considered one of the classics of experimental minimalist music. The only previous performance in Belfast was given by the Gavin Bryars Ensemble in 2012, during the centennial year of the disaster.

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Beijing Modern Music Festival

Belfast to Beijing

Monday 19th May 2025 Central Conservatory of Music, Beijing, China

Belfast to Beijing seeks to find common ground between two distinct musical cultures, through music inspired by folk history, culture and heritage. Gortnagarn II is a personal reflection on our connection with place, and landscape; a meditation on belonging to a very specific patch of earth and Macalla Mhacha, based on Celtic mythology, tells the dramatic story of Macha, ending with her famous curse against all of the men of Ulster. These are the Clouds About the Fallen Sun is an elegy which reflects a very personal interpretation of the Yeats poem, an expression of loss, while Iron Horses tells a story of a young national hero in Chinese history, Huo Qubing, who was a distinguished military general of the Western Han dynasty. The style is based on folk songs, and is imitative of traditional Chinese instruments.

Beijing Modern Music Festival is one of the most prestigious contemporary music festivals in Asia. Hard Rain will be in residence from 17th-20th May, featuring this unique programme of Irish & Chinese music, while engaging with students at the Central Conservatory of Music through workshops and talks.

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For aspiring performers, we select **HRSE Featured Young Artists** each year. This scheme is open to *Ulster Youth Orchestra* performers (present and recent alumni) and auditions are held each September. With several opportunities to sit-in, and perform within the ensemble each Young Artist also helps to create a programme featuring contemporary solo works for their instrument. Hard Rain are also active outside of NI. Having recently launched *Contemporary Cities*, a new partnership with Limerick City and County Council, this initiative funded by Creative Ireland involves Hard Rain working alongside Limerick School of Music and collaborating in new music workshops and performances.

In February we will also work with students at Royal Conservatoire of Scotland in Glasgow, and with student performers and composers at The University of St Andrews as part of New Music Week 2025.

New Repertoire — Bespoke Music



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Two newly composed works, for Hard Rain, have been initiated thanks to funding from Arts Council of Northern Ireland Commissions Fund 2024. These two commissions for full ensemble include a new work from Deirdre Gribbin entitled Ghost Memories and Song from the Last Page of Guests of the Nation by Gareth Williams We're very excited to be collaborating with both and to give the premieres of these works during this 24/25 season.

Special dedications for Hard Rain also feature throughout this season: Dominique Lemaître Les Plis du Temps will receive its première performance in May while Geoff Hannan's new work Breaking News will be premièred in December. On International Women's Day we première a new work by Anita Mawhinney; Pierrette which is a contemporary re-exploration of the famous lovelorn clown, Pierrot.

As always, we present brand-new works by emerging composers funded through **PRSf Talent Development Network.** This year there are two strands to HRSE's *Ink Still Wet* scheme, solo works have been commissioned for piano, violin and flute by Bianca Gannon, Sam Chambers and Fionnuala Fagan-Thiébot, and we have commissioned ensemble works by Omar Zatriqi and Anselm McDonnell.

Our Irish Forests, Rivers and Peatlands programme which receives its première performance at Huddersfield Contemporary Music Festival, is a collaboration between Hard Rain SoloistEnsemble and SARC: Centre for Interdisciplinary Research in Sound and Music. For this programme, three bespoke new pieces have been composed in 2024 by Pedro Rebelo, Lara Weaver and Robert Coleman.

Previous **HRSE commissions** will receive continued exposure this year such as Jane O'Leary Beneath the dark blue waves, Raymond Deane Skew Weft, Amy Rooney Flow State, Piers Hellawell Ground Truthing, Elaine Agnew Green, Ed Bennett Revolver and Ryan Molloy Gortnagarn II. Previous **Peter Rosser Award** finalists also receive further performances; Sam Chambers The Dismemberment of Pentheus, Eduard Zatriqi War Games, Laura Heneghan Flourishes, Kevin Free Kittens in the Kitchen and Daniel Barkley Five Go to Mystery Moor.






